From the President's Desk

Wingecarribee Shire Council Administrator, Mr Viv May recently announced on local radio that their grant application to the NSW Government for \$5 million to upgrade

the Mittagong Memorial Hall complex was unsuccessful. This is not surprising with the state of the finances and the priorities of the State Government battling natural disasters such as floods and Covid 19. The result of this development is that our existing tenancy will be unchanged for some considerable time. Council indicated that grant applications for this project will be ongoing.

Our speaker for the August general meeting will be Kerry Ross. Kerry is the Museum Coordinator at the Goulburn Mulwaree Council. Goulburn, a city in our adjacent local government area is steeped in history which should evolve into an interesting presentation. Kerry's profile can be read on page 3.

Also on page 3 is notification of an exhibition by Mittagong artist Annemarie Dalziel, titled *Imperial Stockings.* This exhibition has significant historical interest and evokes the cross-cultural connections between the Southern Highlands and the Scottish Highlands. Successful sale of our surplus books has encouraged our Librarian, Carolyn to continue with de-cluttering our shelves – on page 4 is a new list of books for sale.

Our Society has entered our website in the Dorothy Fellows Website Award in the category: *Best website designed and administered by a society member*. I think our website is exceptionally good and credit should go to Linda Emery for her design of the site.

In last month's newsletter we featured Dr Wise and the grandfather clock donated to our Society. A history of five doctors from the same Moss Vale practice was the subject of our July general meeting presentation. The family history group continues each month with a small but eager group researching their family histories and the associated facilities and procedures available. At our last meeting Philip Morton gave an interesting presentation on scanning and editing photographs, forms and documents.

The talk: Goulburn Mulwaree Museums, 1843-2022

Kerry has a background in the Higher Education sector having worked at University of Wollongong for almost 20 years as Tutor, Research Assistant, Author, Academic Librarian and lastly Archives Manager for the university corporate and cultural collections. During this latter period Kerry worked to promote public access to the university archives through collection digitisation projects and a busy schedule of exhibitions to showcase the archive collections to local, regional and international visitors.

Since joining the Museums Team at Goulburn Mulwaree Council in May 2019, Kerry has curated the opening exhibition at Rocky Hill War Memorial Museum, managed grant funded projects and is currently working to implement the Rocky Hill War Memorial Museum Strategic Plan 2019-2022 and prepare for the next exhibition.

Kerry is supported in managing Council museums by three permanent staff members, a team of 6 casual museum attendants and more than 30 dedicated volunteers, some of whom have contributed their time for more than 20 years.

Kerry is looking forward to curating future exhibitions, building programming for students and the general public, opening an onsite public research centre and developing and implementing a digitisation plan with staff and volunteers to share this nationally significant collection with a broader online audience.

Invitation to Mittagong art exhibition

An exhibition by Mittagong artist Annemaree Dalziel, titled *Imperial Stockings* is showing at Fundamental Gallery, 11 Station Street Mittagong, 12 to 22 August, open daily from 10am - 5pm.

BDHS members are invited by the artist to attend the opening on Saturday 13 August, from 2 pm to 4 pm.

Annemaree is a Doctor of Creative Arts candidate at the University of Wollongong, and the exhibition is part of her doctoral research, rather than being commercially oriented.

In the exhibition she introduces seven pairs of beautiful hand-knitted long socks that incorporate texts and iconic images in their designs. These *Imperial Stockings* are both contemporary artworks and conversation catalysts evoking historical and cross-cultural connections between the Southern Highlands and the Scottish Highlanders.



The artist says that 'The *Imperial Stockings* chronicle a story of loss. The Highland Clearances displaced Gaelic-speaking Scots to Australia in the 19th century. Some settled in the Southern Highlands on land that – in a similar pattern – was acquired by the displacement of the Indigenous people living there'.

'While the story of the Clearances is only one of many such stories reverberating worldwide across time and space, it is one that opened my eyes and heart to how I came to be an Australian, and what it might take to truly belong here. In telling this story of cultural grief and trauma, I am inviting people to join me in asking, "What happened to all that grief?".







Dr Guy Gurney Memorial Bundanoon

In last month's newsletter it was mentioned that a grandfather clock was recently donated to the BDHS.

Linda Emery noted that the clock had been presented in 1954 to Dr Allen Wise by the citizens of Moss Vale. It is now located in the foyer outside our upstairs meeting room at the Mittagong Archives/Research Centre as a public memorial that will be enhanced with a brief history and photographs of Dr Wise's life.

Linda also noted that two other doctors who served in the same practice, Dr Alcorn and Dr Gurney, have public memorials dedicated to them – the Alcorn Memorial Clock in Moss Vale and the Guy Gurney Memorial entrance gates at Morton National Park.

A history of each of these memorials will be provided in this newsletter, with Dr Gurney's memorial and his life being the feature this month.

Of the five doctors in the Moss Vale practice whom we spoke about at our July meeting – Drs Stevenson, Alcorn, Wise, Newton and Gurney – the only one locally born was Dr Gurney. His life was unfortunately cut short, an illness causing death at age 34, in 1953.

GUY STEPHEN GURNEY was born at Bowral in 1919, his father being Richard Victor GURNEY and his mother Ethel Grace STEPHENS.

Ethel, born at Bowral in 1896, was the third daughter of Alfred and Elizabeth Stephens. Their family history is well known to some of our members.

In brief, Alfred Stephens emigrated from Middlesex, England, coming to Bowral in 1885. His wife-to-be followed a year later. After working for two years to


gain local building trade experience in Bowral, Alfred established in business, constructing numerous houses in Bowral.

By 1896 he had become an alderman on Bowral Municipal Council and by May that year completed the building of Bowral Court House. The following year he built the Superintendent's



residence at Berrima Gaol. He was also a prominent member of the Methodist Church and was Noble Grand of the local lodge of Oddfellows.

In 1903 he was joined in business by his son, also Alfred, who was born in 1887 and attended Bowral Public School. Together they constructed many prominent buildings, including the Empire Picture Theatre in Bowral. In 1917 Alf senior retired, handing the business over to Alf junior (then 30 years old) with provision for his younger brother Norris to come in when he turned 21. Alf senior moved to Manly with his wife and died there in 1924, aged 54 years.



Alf Stephens & Son grew to become a prominent local builder, contractor and supply merchant, with constructions including Ranalegh House, Robertson, Dormie House, Moss Vale and new District Hospital buildings at Bowral in 1933. The business also took on work further afield, in various parts of NSW and in Canberra where they constructed the Girl's Grammar School and 700 inner suburban houses during the 1930s and early 1940s.

Guy Gurney thus inherited strong connections to the well-respected local family of Alfred Stephens Senior, being his grandson, and being the nephew of his mother's brothers, Alfred Jnr and Norris.



Guy's father, known as Victor, while still a young man in 1912, opened a plumbing business in Bong Bong St, Bowral (pictured above) and then, in 1919, purchased land in Wingecarribee St on which he built a weatherboard office and workshop, and moved his plumbing business there. W D Platt joined him in a business partnership in 1924, and a considerable wholesale commodities distribution business was built up, known as Gurney & Platt. Victor's link with the Stephens family would no doubt have helped the business to thrive from the 1920s to the 1940s. Victor withdrew from the business in 1955, but his family continued to hold shares in the company after its incorporation in 1966.



A new brick premises (above) was built in 1971 on the Wingecarribee St site, serving as a hardware store for trade and retail sales. In 1974 the Adams family purchased the Platt's shares in the Company. In 1976 the sales of materials and appliances was made a separate entity, under the name Bowral Trading Company (later renamed Jays Hardware), while the service side of the Company continued to trade for some time as Gurney & Platt Pty Ltd.

Richard Victor Gurney married Ethel Grace Stephens in 1918 at Manly and they then took up residence in Boolwey St, Bowral, raising Guy and a daughter Ruth (who when an adult married H S Nelson and moved to Inverell).

Guy attended Bowral Primary and High Schools and achieved high attainment in academic studies.

On 14 May 1937, as part of coronation celebrations in Bowral, a large crowd gathered for the ceremony of planting Red Pin Oaks in Station St between Bong Bong and Merrigang Sts. Children selected from schools in the district performed the plantings, the first tree being planted by Guy Gurney as Bowral High School representative. He would then have been in the senior class and most likely a prefect or captain. Guy graduated in medicine from the University of Sydney in 1943, and after the usual probationary period of 12 months at the Coast Hospital, where he met his future wife, he enlisted in the Australian Army Medical Corps with the rank of Captain.

He saw service in the islands to the north of Australia but was taken seriously ill at Tarakan. Flown back to Australia he entered Concord military hospital for an immediate operation. Upon his discharge from the Army a year later, in 1944, he married Elsie Elisabeth Hellier at the Wesley Chapel, the principal of the College officiating at the ceremony.

Shortly after Guy and Elsie married, they moved to Bundanoon, he taking up as a medical practitioner and quickly establishing himself 'as the result of a quiet and pleasing personality' (quote from *The Southern Mail*, 1953). He served the entire community of the Shire's



southern area, assisted in the Moss Vale practice of Doctors William Newton and Allen Wise, and did duty at the Berrima District Hospital in Bowral.

His wife Elsie, a trained nursing sister who served her probationary term and later as sister at the Coast Hospital, also became a popular figure in Bundanoon and the wider area. Elsie and Guy had three sons, Peter, Stephen and David.

Sadly, Dr Gurney passed away on 2 June 1953, having been ill for some time. He was aged 34 years and the youngest son, David, was just 12 months old. *The Moss Vale Post* of 5 June 1953 published a heart-felt obituary and an article about his funeral, from which the following is extracted:

"Although Dr Gurney's stay in Bundanoon was relatively short, he established for himself a wide popularity, and those foremost in advancing the interests of that centre testified to his eagerness to join in everything, when the limited time available enabled him to do so . . . Adding to the sorrow associated with the passing of such a young and promising medical figure are three young sons . . . When he realised that the end was not far off, Dr Gurney expressed a wish to be taken home to Bowral, so that he could be with his parents at the last." This was granted and he died seven days later.

Under the heading 'Masses of Wreaths', the paper noted that the "wealth of wreaths and floral tributes handed in by mourners and sympathisers to the funeral service in the Methodist Church, Bowral, yesterday morning was living testimony of the popularity of the late Dr Guy Gurney". "Prominent amongst the congregation which was unable to gain entry to the church owing to the large assembly, were residents of Bundanoon where the late Doctor had practiced for the past few years. He endeared himself to the entire populace of Bundanoon . . . Already a suggestion has been made for a simple memorial in his honour."

Several months later, a Dr Gurney Memorial Fund was opened at Bundanoon and made available for contributions from other centres. The *Southern Mail* of 23 October 1953 advised that, to provide an opportunity for Bowral residents to contribute to the Dr Guy Gurney Memorial Fund, arrangements had been made for contributions to be received at Crago's Pharmacy, Bong Bong Street.

Similar collection points were opened in every town between Moss Vale and Tallong so that the whole district could contribute to some fitting tribute to Dr Gurney's memory. The actual form of the tribute was to be decided by public meetings in Bundanoon, but became a complex issue and it took several years for a solution to be agreed upon.

The *Moss Vale Post* of 28 February 1958 reported that at first the memorial was to take the form of a town clock, but a number of obstacles presented themselves, and the plans were reviewed. A happy thought came to the members of the Gullies Trust who were engaged on an expansion scheme in the Bundanoon Recreation Reserve, and a proposal that an entrance gateway be erected to take the form of a memorial was finally adopted.

GURNEY MEMORIAL UNVEILING AT BUNDANOON

On Saturday afternoon, 8 March 1958, a memorial to the late Dr Guy Gurney in the form of two sandstone pillars at the entrance to the Bundanoon Recreation Reserve was unveiled by the NSW Minister for Lands, the Hon William McCulloch Gollan.

The *Moss Vale Post* reported him saying that the gentleman in whose memory this entrance has been erected must have been held in the highest regard by the citizens, as he surveyed the large gathering before unveiling the memorial. He later commented

that beforehand he had been taken for an inspection of the beautiful reserve and was very impressed, and hoped he would visit again.

The sandstone used came from a Bundanoon quarry and the work was carried out by Mr Frank Hayman of Bundanoon. Mr R Newton-Tabrett, Engineer to Wingecarribee Shire, was the honorary architect.

The President of the Trust controlling the Reserve, Mr Russell Barton, the President of Wingecarribee Shire Council, Cr H T Ellsmore, and Cr G Wood-Davies, in addressing the gathering, in turn paid tribute to the lovable, sterling qualities of the Doctor, who had never spared himself in the service of the sick and suffering. Members of Dr Gurney's family present were his widow and three sons, his sister and his parents. His father addressed the gathering, saying that he had some idea of the great regard the people had for his son when he received over 800 letters and cards after his death.

After the ceremony, the Trustees served afternoon tea at Gambell's Memorial Shelter in the Reserve.

The memorial pillars still adorn the entrance to the Bundanoon Gullies Recreation Reserve, located a short way from the town centre, down Constitution Hill. The Reserve is now part of Morton National Park, run by the National Parks & Wildlife Service.



The pillars are an enduring tribute to Dr Gurney and to those that brought the memorial into existence including the



Gullies Trustees, the many local people who contributed financially, and the skill of the architect and stonemason.
