ARMFIELD, George	NO	<p>The funeral of the late Mr George Armfield, on Friday morning last was largely attended. The Cortege moved from St. Stephen's Church to Rowe's Hill Cemetery, where the remains were interred in the Church of England grounds, Rev C P Brown, officiating at the graveside.</p> <p>The Coroner's inquiry into the cause of the late George Armfield's death decided that he died from natural causes, ie heart disease.</p> <p><i>The Mittagong Star, 11 Apr 1930 p2</i></p> <p>Mr George Armfield, aged 74, one of Mittagong's oldest identities, died suddenly on Wednesday evening. BAKER, Emma	NO	<p>The death occurred on, Thursday last, at her residence, "Swallowbeck", Oaklands Estate, Mittagong, of Mrs Stephen Baker, at the age of 78 years. The deceased lady was born at Swallowbeck, Lincolnshire, England, and came to Australia in 1885, landing at Rockhampton, Queensland, afterwards coming to Sydney, where she married Mr S Baker. Two years later they removed to Mittagong, where her husband purchased land in the Oaklands Estate, establishing an orchard and poultry farm in the pioneering days of these industries. The late Mrs Baker was sincerely loved by all who knew her; her bright cheerful manner made her presence welcome o all occasions, especially during the war period when the Red Cross and other organisations were working to supply comforts</p>

		<p>for the soldiers and sailors. Although past the allotted span of life hardly any kind of weather prevented her attendance on these occasions, bringing back the work she had done during the previous week and taking the future week's work home. The loss of her youngest son at the front only seemed to redouble her efforts for the boys, and any word of sympathy for her in her loss only brought the response that others needed greater sympathy. Although at the last she was severely ill for only a couple of days, she realised that she might pass away at any time and carefully arranged all details of her affairs in anticipation of the end. In addition to her husband the deceased leaves a son by her first marriage, Mr F Batchelor, of Oaklands, to mourn her loss. BLATCH, Arthur Francis	YES	On Thursday, November 5 th , Arthur F Blatch, aged 20, while working at Colo, received a severe wound in his left thigh through falling on the point of a scythe. A messenger was despatched to Colo Vale and Dr Solomons and the B D Ambulance summoned. An hour and ten minutes after the accident the doctor and ambulance arrived, and the patient conveyed to the B. D. Hospital. On Friday gas gangrene developed in the wound and Blatch was rushed to Sydney by ambulance. The 82 miles was covered in two hours, the ambulance at times showing a speed of 70 miles an hour. At midnight, the lad's leg was amputated in an endeavour to save his life. BOSTOCK, Peter	NO	<p>One of the oldest and most highly respected residents of Hill Top, Mr Peter Bostock, passed away in the Berrima District Hospital on Wednesday last at the age of 86 years. Known throughout the district for his generous assistance to charities and his kindness towards all with whom he came in contact his passing will be deeply regretted by many.</p> <p>Mr Bostock came to Australia in 1876 on an old sailing ship 'The Windsor Castle'. The journey took one hundred and three days. After spending some time in Queensland, he came to Mittagong and for many years was interested in the iron mines there. About 1886 Mr Bostock joined the railway department and went to live at Hill Top where he resided until his death. He retired from the railway service in 1913.</p> <p>Mr Bostock actively associated himself with the work of the Church of England. He was present at the laying of the foundation stone of St Stephen's Church at Mittagong and was one of the first elders of the Colo Vale church. He assisted in the building of the Hill Top Church where he worshipped regularly.</p> <p>Rev Stephen Taylor, of Mittagong, conducted a special service at the church prior to the funeral. A large gathering of friends, both at the church and at the graveside, and many beautiful floral tributes testified to the esteem in which the late Mr Bostock was held.</p> <p>He is survived by a widow, four daughters, daughters, Mrs T Gudgeon and Mrs F Hines (Mittagong), Mrs Rolph and Ruby (Neutral Bay), and Ethel (Hill Top), and one son, Stanley (Queensland), to whom we extend our sympathy.</p> <p><i>Southern Mail 9 Feb 1937 p3</i></p>

<p>BOSWELL, Albert Ernest</p>	<p>YES</p>	<p>The death occurred in the Berrima District Hospital on Friday of Albert Ernest Boswell at the age of 78 years, whose name will long be remembered in Mittagong for the enthusiasm he displayed and the example he set in the exercise of civic pride amongst his fellow citizens.</p> <p>For many years deceased, with the assistance of his wife, who predeceased him about five years ago, had charge of one of the establishments at the Mittagong Farm Homes, where his sterling example and helpful advice set many a lad back on the pathway to citizenship. He was proud of the Farm and its inmates, and found delight in rendering assistance where it was most needed.</p> <p>One of the public appearances to which he looked forward year by year was the annual exhibition of farm produce and handiwork by the lads at the annual district show. Parties of lads would be taken to the showground under the charge of the late principal, Mr Mitchell, and himself, and valuable work performed in preparing the trotting track and the pavilion. Their exhibit was greatly admired by the general public. Mr Boswell, together with his late chief, was a member of the committee for some years.</p> <p>Retiring, deceased was not satisfied to sit down – his work well done – but continued his interest in the advancement of the town of Mittagong. His ambition rested largely in the establishment of public swimming baths, and with these installed, he elected to act as supervisor of the pool, and many of the swimmers of the town will recall the sympathetic attention and advice of Mr Boswell.</p> <p>His interests also centred in the Berrima District Hospital about 15 to 20 years ago, when he was on the committee of the institution.</p> <p>Following a service on Sunday afternoon, the remains were laid to rest in the Church of England cemetery, Rev Mr Standon officiating. Mr G Beavan had charge of the arrangements.</p> <p>A son Reg, who was wounded at the Fromelles battle in July, 1916, survives him.</p> <p><i>Moss Vale Post 20 Mar 1945 p2</i> NO HEADSTONE</p>
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BOSWELL, Grace F	YES	<p>Mrs Boswell, wife of Ald A E Boswell, aged 62 years died on Friday morning after a long and painful illness.</p> <p>Mrs Boswell was a trained nurse, who after 3 years' training in Parramatta Hospital, took up private nursing and was appointed Matron of Braidwood Hospital, which position she retained for 6 years. After this she was appointed to the position of Mother-in-charge of Invalid State Children at Parramatta Homes.</p> <p>In 1905 Mrs Boswell was promoted to the position of Matron-in-charge of the Industrial School, Mittagong.</p> <p>This was the commencement of treating the boys in a different manner to that which was carried out in the old Sobroan.</p> <p>As the system carried out by her and her husband proved successful, the Sobroan was laid aside.</p> <p>The Homes have now grown into a most beneficial system to the State.</p> <p>Mrs Boswell carried out her work at the Farm Homes for about 20 years, when from continued heavy work and war worries she had to give up her position owing to a serious nervous breakdown.</p> <p>During Mrs Boswell's time in the Homes she had nearly 4000 boys pass through her hands, their ages ranging from somewhere about 7 to 20 years. A great many of these boys have at all times kept in touch with their mentor. There are many of these boys now in responsible positions and a credit to the State. It has been common knowledge that for many years past many of these boys, with their wives and families, spend their holidays with the Boswell family in Mittagong.</p> <p>During the Great War 146 of Mrs Boswell's old boys went to the front, most of whom kept in touch with her; a number returned with honours, but some of those whom she loved remained there.</p> <p>During Mrs Boswell's visits to hospital there would always be found a number of the old boys her</p>

		<p>visitors to see their Matron-Mother, as they called her.</p> <p>It was very gratifying to Mr Boswell and his sons to see so many old boys attend the funeral on Saturday last. The funeral was one of the largest ever witnessed in Mittagong. The Rev. S A Turner officiated at the graveside. The remains being interred at the Rowe's Hill Cemetery, Lower Mittagong.</p> <p>The pall-bearers were returned soldiers, Messrs A N Chew, O Earl, R H Helson and J Armfield.</p> <p>While the cortege was passing the Superintendent's quarters the roadside was lined by boys at the Farm Homes.</p> <p>At the graveside the Farm Home boys sang "abide with me".</p> <p>Mr H Pearce (Salvation Army) as well as Mr Turner delivered touching addresses on the high esteem in which the late Mrs Boswell was held by all.</p> <p>Mrs Boswell is survived by her husband (Mr A E Boswell) and two sons (Messrs Reginald and Charles).</p> <p><i>The Mittagong Star 28 Mar 1930 p2</i> NO HEADSTONE</p>
BOSWELL, Charles	YES	<p>The sudden death of Mr Charles Boswell, of Mittagong, in the District Hospital, on Thursday, will come as a shock to his many friends. Deceased, who was 33 years old, was the youngest son of Mr and the late Mrs A E Boswell, of Mittagong. He became seriously ill on Wednesday night and was rushed by the ambulance to the hospital, where the carbogen apparatus was used by the ambulance officers from 10 p.m. until 2.30 a. m. in a vain endeavour to save his life. It is understood that kidney trouble was the cause of his death.</p> <p>Mr Boswell's genial personality endeared him to all whom he came into contact with and like the other members of the Boswell family he interested himself in every movement for the advancement</p>

		<p>of the town. The gates at the entrance to the Mittagong Swimming Baths will stand as a monument to his genius as he designed them. Many social bodies in Mittagong will miss him as he was always ready to assist in the designing and erection of decorations for various functions.</p> <p>It was his custom every year to make the wreath which the Mittagong Returned Soldiers placed on the War Memorial on Anzac Day. BOYD, Thomas Samuel	YES	<p>The late Mr Thomas Boyd, whose death was briefly reported in our issue of 21st June, was the eldest son of Mr John Boyd, of Currumbin, Queensland. He came to Mittagong six years ago, and was employed at Tooth and Co's maltings at the time of his death, which occurred after a short illness from pneumonia. He married Kathleen, the eldest daughter of Mr W Tyrrell, of Nattai, Mittagong, and he leaves a family of five young children to mourn their loss. The deceased was highly respected, and his death came as a shock to the people of Mittagong. As instancing(?) his thought for o'here(sic), and a fact which probably hastened if not caused his death, it may be mentioned that upon hearing of the death of a friend's child he rode his bicycle to Bowral – although suffering severely from a heavy cold – and became overheated. Upon returning home he went to bed and gradually got worse until he died. Many a legal derelict has been unostentatiously relieved by the deceased judge, who, generous to a degree, obeyed the Biblical injunction not to let the left hand know what the right did. Mr Edgar Alfred Cottee, for many years the manager of the local branch of the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney, Ltd, was announced.

The deceased was apparently in the best of health the previous evening, and was just preparing to enter his office on Saturday morning to commence the day's business when he suddenly collapsed as the result of paralytic stroke, and when found a few minutes afterwards was in a state of unconsciousness, from which he never recovered until the time he passed away in mid afternoon. Mr Cottee had suffered from nervous attacks for some time, and in July last experienced a breakdown, when he had jokingly described to his friends the temporary loss of the use of his limbs. After a short holiday for recuperation he again resumed charge of the bank, and was to all appearances once more his old self when the blow fell, resulting in his death practically 'in harness'.

He was a son of Mrs Cottee, of Burwood, and of the late Mr Wm Alfred Cottee. Father and son have been well-known figures in the financial life of NSW. Mr W A Cottee was manager of the late Australian Mercantile Land and Finance Company, of Bligh Street Sydney. Mr Cottee succeeded Mr John Horniman as manager of the Mittagong branch of the Commercial Banking Co of Sydney some years ago, and was a capable and valued officer of the bank. During the whole of his long period of residence in Mittagong he had undiminished respect of his fellow citizens. In his official position he was a trusted adviser; as a citizen he was ever eager for the benefit and advancement of the town and district, and he was extremely popular in the social life of the town. In younger days a great patron of sport; he was well known as a footballer, at tennis and on the cricket field, and was a proficient wielder of both bat and ball when the district was noted for its cricket. Every worthy institution in the town found a liberal supporter in Mr Cottee. He was the moving spirit in the progress association of the past, and in most of the more transient local movements was generally to be found in the position of hon treasurer. In this connection he was of considerable assistance to the Voluntary Workers' Association and to other patriotic movements in connection with the war. The town of Mittagong will not be the same without Mr E A Cottee, and to his widow and family we extend our sympathy in their great loss.

They played rugby union in those days on Snowden's paddock, near</p>

where Frensham School is now. When the 13-a-side game came into being, Philip Cupitt switched to that code and was a foundation member of Mittagong Rugby League Football Club.

Since then four generations of the family have played for the club. His sons, Adrian 'Butch' Cupitt and Phil Cupitt (born in 1915) followed their father and made their careers with Mittagong RLFC. Both had fierce reputations on the field as fiery forwards and were still winning best player awards approaching their 40s.

Adrian's sons, Bob and the late Kevin Cupitt, together with Phil's son John (Mick) Cupitt continued in their father's footsteps.

As celebrant Charles Dunk recalled during the funeral oration, 'the love of Phil's life was Rugby League. He played his first game at the age of 15 years and his last – aged 44 years – a game he shared with Mick. His team was always Mittagong. After finishing playing he was a good referee and the club honoured him by making him a Life Member'. Mr Dunk said Phil was, as locals would say, a 'Mittagong' boy and man.

He was born in Mittagong on December 27 1915, was educated locally at Mittagong Primary School, and when he left school went to work in his father's butchery. He used to recall delivering meat in a basket over his arm. He left the shop to work in the Tooth & Co Maltings and stayed there for about 20 years. Always used to strong physical work, his next job was clearing timber in the Burragorang Valley for the coming Warragamba Dam. His last job was in the mines in the Oakdale area, from which he retired when turned 60.

That was his sporting and working life but always important to him was his family life that began when he married Mittagong girl Queenie Andrews, on October 28 1939. They celebrated their Diamond Anniversary just last year having lived their entire married life in Arthur Street Mittagong, where Mrs Cupitt still resides. They raised four children, Mick and Jillian and later Janine & Diane, and have 10 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Speaking of his family relationship Mr Dunk said, 'Phil, Mick told me, was a great father to all his

		<p>children and treated all equally. The management was formed into a company in March 1924 when the name was altered to the 'Southern Mountains Butchery' but Mr Cupitt obtained control of the business. His son Wallie was manager of it for some years until it was purchased by Mr Ray Madden in March 1948.</p> <p>A great lover of horses, Mr Cupitt exhibited at many shows and had a rug made entirely of championship ribbons. His best-known horses were 'Saxon' and 'Peanuts' and Mrs Gordon Spackman of Mittagong rode and drove them at many shows. He was a keen supporter of Mittagong Football Club and was president of the Mittagong Bowling Club for a period.</p> <p>In his business dealings, Mr Cupitt bore a name for honesty and courtesy and soon built up the</p>

butchery business in Bowral which was failing when he took it over. He made a host of friends through his business and was widely known throughout the Berrima District.

Mr Cupitt married Miss Annie Griffiths at St Stephen's Church Mittagong. She, with one son, Wallie , and three daughter's Mesdames Fleming and Gray (both at Mittagong) and Nancy (Manly) survive.

Mr Cupitt had been a regular attendant and supporter of the Methodist Church at Mittagong and later at Manly. Prior to the funeral to Rowes Hill Cemetery on Friday, service was conducted by the Rev Guy Walker and the Rev Norman Parry of Manly. The large attendance at the funeral testified to the high esteem in which Mr Cupitt was held.

Some excerpts from an article titled 'The late Walter Cupitt' – An appreciation – printed in same above edition of the Southern Mail. All who knew him will realize that in the passing of Walter Cupitt, there has gone out from our midst and the life of this community one of the boldest and most courageous spirits it has ever been our privilege to meet.

In his years of retirement, gardening and bowls were his chief recreations and in the latter he found the relaxation he so greatly sought after. He enjoyed a fair measure of health and strength until a severe bout of pneumonia laid him low for some three years ago, an illness from which he never fully recovered.

Walter was a very humble man, a man of the ordinary people. He was a very friendly man. It can be truly be said of him that he was 'the friend of all, the enemy of none. No unkind word ever fell from his lips and rumours and gossip he abhorred and discounted.

When severe spinal trouble some 18 years ago threatened to put him down for the rest of his life he entered a hospital at Castle Crag where a clever surgeon performed a difficult and dangerous operation. When I saw him there he was smiling and happy, the operation had been a success and a very dark shadow had passed. It was not only the surgeon's skill but his own indomitable courage that got him well and into life again.

He conducted the local newsagency at Mittagong for some time and in 1924 took over the Commercial Hotel, then later the Exchange Hotel (now the Hotel Mittagong).

In 1926 he was back at the Commercial Hotel, which he relinquished when Tooth and Co rebuilt the old three-storey structure.

Between 1929 and 1939 he worked Victoria Park, a farm between Thirlmere and The Oaks which had been a grant to the Dobson family in 1829.

He had the Family Hotel at Thirlmere for a time then took over the Great Southern Hotel, Berry, and in 1944 was in the Kurrajong Heights Hotel.

After this he returned to Thirlmere, until his death, when the hotel passed to Ted Dobson, later becoming the Welcome Inn.

Mrs Dobson spent the last period of her life at Bargo, where she died in hospital on Sunday, March

FLINT, Percy Edward	YES	<p>The following is an account of the death of Percy Edward Flint, who was accidentally shot, near Jelloar Creek, whilst wallaby shooting. Deceased was one of a party of four, and left Nattai late on the evening of the 26th. They all camped for the night near Lake's farm and started at 4 o'clock on Monday morning to shoot across the cultivation paddocks; they finally went into the scrub, firing in very extended order, till they came to the creek in which the accident took place. The particulars hitherto reported are inaccurate, as only two persons really witnessed what took place. The party formed in a line across the gully. Messrs Dawson, Flint, and Lee, armed with shot guns, took one side of the creek; and William Flavelle took the other side, where the country was more open, for he carried a revolving-rifle. Following out Mr Flint's directions, he kept slightly ahead, so as to keep the game from crossing the creek and escaping up the less precipitous side of the gully. Flint shot a wallaby, and stopped to take the tail. Flavelle fired a bullet at a wallaby, and probably missed. Lee then fired at it, and immediately Flint cried out he was shot, and was found by the party sitting on a rocky ledge, with the tail of the wallaby by his side, and, on opening his shirt, his breast was found to be pierced with fifteen shot, as was subsequently discovered, although at first only seven shot were found. This was at twenty five minutes to 8 in the morning. He bled internally, and knew he was dying from the very first. All was done that could be thought of to alleviate his sufferings. Mr Lee held him up to prevent his suffocating, whilst Messrs Dawson and Flavelle fetched water in their hats. The former then went for help. Deceased bade him an affectionate farewell, knowing he had not many minutes to live. After Dawson's departure he asked Lee and Flavelle to pray for him, and expired without a groan. He had not a chance, as he was hit on both breasts, the shoulders, side, and heart, and the immediate cause of death was syncope of the heart. He was a man of great courage and splendid physique. He only lived seven minutes after the buckshot entered his breast. He had gained great distinction in various parts of the world in saving life, and told his friends that that was the object for which he lived. While in Indian water, a little girl dropped a kitten overboard, and, childlike, jumped after it. Flint plunged in after her, although the vessel was steaming about twelve knots an hour, and saved her, after an immersion of three quarters of an hour; he saved three other lives. The corpse of Mr Flint was carried to Mr Lake's farm, and Messrs, Lake and Flavelle rode to Berrima, to acquaint the coroner with the affair. After a brief magisterial inquiry, held by Mr Wilshire at Draper's hotel, a decision was arrived at that the death was purely accidental,</p>

		<p>and was caused by the shots in the heart and lungs. Deceased, who was a member of the Church of England, was buried on Tuesday afternoon in the cemetery belonging to that denomination at Mittagong. Deceased was 23 years of age on the first of June, 1880. He was remarkably popular amongst his acquaintances, and his genial manner and gentlemanly bearing gained him a host of friends. Edward Keen deposed that with the assistance of S McCallum he got deceased out of the water; where deceased was drowned there were twelve feet of water. Not much time for study.</p> <p>Alf would call at my house before breakfast with the morning steak (about 3d a lb), rest his basket on the gate post while I presented the plate, and ask if I could give him the answers for his homework. A sulky passing at the time was hailed, and the sufferer was conveyed to the Standard Hotel, where he received every attention from the members of both teams. He, however, treated his injuries very lightly and begged those present not to send for medical aid, stating that he was all right. He expressed a desire to accompany the team home, but in response to earnest solicitations decided to remain for the night, on condition that one of his comrades also remained behind. This was accordingly arranged, and in the meantime medical aid was sought and procured. The Burrowa men promised to do all in their power, and with the knowledge that the patient would receive every care the members of the Mittagong team took their departure for home without any misgivings, and never dreaming for a moment that fatal results were to follow. Subsequently, however, the sufferer became unconscious and was removed to the hospital where he passed away, his wife reaching Burrowa about half an hour after his death.

The deceased was held in the highest respect by all classes of the community. He was a prominent member of the Masonic order, and was also regarded as one of the best rifle shots in the district. In the latter connection he was a tower of strength to his club, and his genial and manly disposition, besides his valuable assistance as coach to the younger members of the club, will leave a vacancy in its ranks that will be hard to fill. The deceased was for many years connected with Bowral H Co Infantry, and was seeking municipal honors at the election on Saturday.

The deceased, who was 46 years of age, leaves a widow and family of six – three sons and three daughters – to mourn the loss of a loving husband and father, and sincere sympathy is expressed for them in their great bereavement.

A shrewd man of business, he was one of the largest property holders in the town, and being so long identified with the district, probably no resident was better known. Two years later he wrote to the Trinity College, London, asking that papers be sent out to Australia to enable him to sit for a still higher examination and qualify for Doctor of Music, which they declined, stating that he would have to proceed to London and study in the College for 6 months, before they would allow him to sit. In 1901 he won the Sydney 'Mail's' competition for the best setting of music to Will H Ogilvie's poem 'Hearts of Gold'. He was associated with an interesting incident when the battleship Australia was leaving Portsmouth for Australia. The ship's band played 'The Star Crossed Flag of Australia', one of Mr Vincent's compositions. On this occasion the Earl of Meath, Sir George Reid, and Admiral Patey were the recipients of copies of this song printed on silk. The combined Mittagong and Bowral bands attended and rendered appropriate numbers. It was known by a few, but very few, that he was ill, but no thought of death had even crossed the mind of his friends or those who knew of his illness. Only a few days previous, in the apparent enjoyment of perfect health and strength, he visited Bowral where he was always warmly greeted. For a week or two past the deceased was unwell, but not sufficiently so to compel him to relinquish his duties. On the Monday previous to his death Constable Waters attended the races at Browley, and afterwards visited the sports ground at Bowral. On the following evening he was one of the guests at the Masonic banquet held at the Grand Hotel, and replied to the toast of the visitors. On Thursday he was, as usual on duty, but in the evening he complained of feeling unwell, and said he would lie down. He did so, alas, never to rise again. Dr Smythe was called in, and administered to the patient, and on Saturday the news spread that he was dangerously ill, and several friends called to see him. The case assuming alarming symptoms, Dr Fisher of Bowral</p>

	<p>was sent for, and a consultation was held between Dr Smythe and him. After carefully diagnosing the case the medical gentlemen unhesitatingly pronounced the illness typhoid fever, and a trained nurse was sent for. On the arrival of the nurse at midnight poor Waters was in a very low state indeed, and despite careful and assiduous nursing and medical attention he never rallied, but continued in the delirium of fever until about eleven o'clock on Sunday morning when death relieved him of his suffering. To show how unexpected was his death Mr H B Bond of Bowral, visited him on Saturday, and finding he was so ill promised to get his book to prepare some jellies for him. He did so and sent the delicacies over on Sunday morning only to find the sufferer had just passed away. The fell disease must certainly have been on him for some time, and it was only his active spirit and unimpaired system that kept him on his feet so long. The news of Constable Waters death caused widespread regret because he was widely known and very highly esteemed. He was a most efficient officer, strict and conscientious, without being officious, and at all times courteous and obliging. In the performance of his duty he displayed tact, skill, and courage. For the past six years he had filled the position of Clerk of Petty Sessions at Mittagong, in which position he proved himself capable and efficient, and particularly so as a deposition clerk, in the carrying out of which duties he has frequently received well-deserved praise. He was a warm-hearted and genial companion, full of anecdotes and reminiscences of former times. Altogether he was a man, and we are sure everyone very sincerely regrets his unfortunate death. We join with others in the hope that after life's fitful fever he sleeps well. The deceased was an Irishman, having been born in Kildare, and was 35 years of age. He was a married man and leaves a widow and five children to mourn their loss of a kind husband and loving father, and with whom every sincere sympathy is felt. The deceased was a respected member of the Masonic Order, and held the position of Senior Warden in the Jubilee Lodge, Mittagong. In the Jubilee Lodge he also filled the post secretary for two years, fulfilling the duties with credit to himself and to the lodge. He was also a member of the Protestant Alliance Friendly Society; he also had his life assured in the Mutual Life Association for £300. At the police court at Mittagong on Monday morning Senior Sergeant Fowler in a feeling manner announced to the bench the death of Constable Waters, acting Clerk of Petty Sessions, and in a manly way referred to him as an energetic and faithful officer. The presiding magistrates, Messrs Girard and Child, JsP, endorsed the Senior Sergeant's remarks, and expressed regret at the lamentable death of the late constable. During Sunday and Monday Mrs Waters received many kind messages of condolence and sympathy from all parts of the district, especially from the deceased's brother Masons. Many</p>

WHITE, John JP	NO	<p>It is our painful duty to record the death of Mr John White JP which took place at his residence, 'Clifton', Queen Street Mittagong, on Tuesday morning. He took ill some three or four months ago, when what was practically an iron constitution broke up, and he gradually sank. Last week however, he considerably improved but on Thursday night a serious relapse set in, and he lingered until 5 o'clock on the morning stated. Although at times during his illness he suffered great pain, his end was very peaceful and he was conscious to the last. He was 67 years of age.</p> <p>The son of a mine manager, the late Mr White was born at Bristol, county Gloucestershire, England, in the year 1834. He came to New South Wales in 1855. Sometime afterwards he secured employment on the railway and subsequently became an inspector, which position he held until five years ago when he retired on a pension. His connection with the railway department extended over the lengthy term of thirty-five years.</p> <p>During an eighteen years' residence in Mittagong, the late Mr White endeared himself to a large circle of friends, and his many sterling qualities earned for him the highest esteem of the residents, not only in Mittagong but in other parts of the district. He took an active working interest in the public life of the town, and was closely associated with various charitable and philanthropic movements.</p> <p>For a number of years he was an alderman, and as such rendered valuable service to the borough; while for two years in succession he occupied the Mayoral chair. He was treasurer of the School of Arts from its inception up to about a year ago, when he was appointed a vice president of the institution. He also held the position of Minster's Warden in connection with St Stephen's Church of England, and was superintendent of the Sunday school. Altogether Mr White proved himself an estimable townsman and his death is greatly regretted.</p> <p>The deceased leaves a widow and a family of four sons and four daughters, viz, Mr A E White (Surrey Hills), Mr John G White (Goulburn), Mr H White (Gosford), Master A White (Mittagong), Missus Treadwell (Woolgoolga), and Misses Violet, Rose and Clara White, of Mittagong.</p>

		<p>The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon, and was largely attended. A service was first conducted by the Rev Dr Rutledge in St Stephen's Church, where the 'Dead March' was played by Mrs Prott, and the hymn 'The Christian's Goodnight' rendered. The cortege afterwards moved off to the Lower Mittagong cemetery, and the remains of deceased were interred in the Church of England portion. The Rev Dr Rutledge officiated at the grave, and in an impressive address paid a high tribute to the life of the late Mr White. On his retirement from the department several years ago he was in charge of the Royal Exchange Post Office, Sydney. He is survived by Mrs White and one son.</p> <p><i>Southern Mail 11 Oct 1946 p1</i></p> <p>Reference was made in last issue to the death at Mittagong of Mr Thomas White at the age of 79 years. Further details of his life are published below.</p> <p>Although a native of Berrima, Mr White spent much of his early life in the Riverina before returning to the district, and in 1882 he entered the Postal Department at Moss Vale, where he remained for eight years.</p> <p>Still in his early twenties, he was appointed postmaster, first to Hungerford and later to Barrington, in the far West, then an important border town between New South Wales and Queensland before Federation.</p> <p>In the capacity of postmaster he spent a number of years at Gulargambone, Hillgrove, Newcastle, Millthorpe, Penrith, and finally the Royal Exchange, a position he held for six years before retiring in 1927, when he had completed forty-five years in the Postal Department.</p> <p>Mr White was twice married: first to Miss Catherine Bow. There was one son, Roland, born of this union, and he is now resident at Epping. In 1933 Mr White married Pattie, widow of the late Mr W T</p>

		<p>Kerridge of Mittagong.</p> <p>His many friends knew Mr White as a man of great integrity and generosity. None will forget his bright disposition and ready wit.
